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Giving Tuesday seeks support of bike patrol

On December 3, the Tuesday following Thanksgiving Day, individuals around the world will pledge their support to local nonprofit organizations. Giving Tuesday is everyone's day to include charitable groups in end-ofyear holiday giving.

The American River Bike Patrol (ARBP) asks for your donation on Giving Tuesday. Here's why:

Atop their efforts to improve trail safety, in partnership with UC Davis Health, the American River Bike Patrol has fitted hundreds of needy kids with bike helmets to prevent brain injuries, the #1 cause of death and disabilities to children, and it created a Junior Patroller program that has, in the past two years, trained 50 at-risk teens to cycle safely on city streets, become leaders, be first aiders and provide

The Bike Patrol's 115 members provide emergency first aid and bike repair assistance to cyclists, walkers, equestrians and other users on the 32-mile A merican River Parkway, one of the most heavily-used recreation trails in North America (8 million users) and on other multi-use trails in



community service.

Since it began patrolling, the Bike Patrol has been honored by state and local governments for having made a difference in trail safety and it has twice been named the best bike patrol in the nation.

The bike patrol serves as safety ambassadors along these trails, positively and gently informing trail users of trail etiquette, providing directions and assistance to those in need, being watchful for public safety and actively looking for people who need medical or mechanical assistance.

Bike Patrollers undergo rigorous and ongoing training to become certified in first aid, CPR, bike repair and trail etiquette. Since they began patrolling in 2020, ARBP's patrollers have patrolled more than 5,900 times, have ridden 16,476 hours and 107,169 miles, helped nearly 12,200 trail users, repaired 763 bicycles and provided emergency first aid to 1,298 cyclists, pedestrians and equestrians, while saving several lives. Each year, ARBP members help hundreds of trail users fix flat tires, assist with bike adjustments and offer safe cycling and walking advice.

Each year, the patrol makes well over 200 first aid interactions, from scrapes, twisted ankles, abrasions and medical emergencies including diabetic coma and heart attacks.





The patrol regularly offers trail-side hydration, helmet-fitting and informational kiosks.

Our 115 members offer friendly interaction with parkway users and plenty of suggestions for safe family outings.



The patrol started a Junior Patrol in 2023, with 17 students from Cordova and Grant High Schools. This year the program has over 30 students headed for a Nov. 9 graduation!
